Registering for Classes (SH 2.3)

- Consult the [Law School Course Schedule](#)
 - Check “Notes” column for graduation and WI Diploma Privilege requirements
 - Use credit columns to determine how credits apply to 90, 64, and 60-credit rules
 - Pay attention to **highlights** and recent changes 
- Enroll through Course Search & Enroll at your enrollment time!
 - Consent of instructor courses
 - Wait list process
- If you haven't completed the 1L curriculum, you must have permission from Dean Devine to enroll in a non-1L course/elective!



Part-time Enrollment (SH 10.3)

- Enrolled for fewer than 12 credits
- For financial implications see the Law School Director of Scholarship Administration in the Admissions Office, Lori Hickman
- If fewer than 12 credits: UW Law Scholarship disbursement may be reduced or eliminated
- If fewer than 6 credits: Federal loan deferment expires; grace period begins unless already used up.
- International students: check with ISS

Upper-Level Writing Requirement (ULWR) (SH 4.4.2)



- Requirements: 20 pages, double-spaced (total); feedback on draft; final submission
- **May NOT be met in the same course, same term as Experiential Learning Requirement**
- Submit completed form
- Unsure? Check *My Student Info* page
- **It's HIGHLY RECOMMENDED you do not leave this to your final semester**

Advising & Curriculum

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Am I On Track?

90 credits required to graduate

- Should average 15 credits per semester (90 credits ÷ standard 6 semesters (3 years) of law school)

Which means:

- At the end your 1L year: goal of 30 credits completed
- At the end of your 2L year: 60 credits completed
- At the mid-point of your 3L year: 75 credits completed

Summer credits may expedite graduation

- Broad legal education

- Improve skills
- Bar exam subjects and MPRE

Non-Law Classes (SH 2.5)

- Requires completion of 1L Program
- Up to six (6) credits of graduate level or foreign language course work may count towards 90 credits needed for JD, subject to conditions.
- **Must have permission to receive credit**, form available on [forms](#) page.
- Must receive a “B” or better.
- Does not factor into GPA, 64- or 60-credit rules

- Programs in: Germany ♦ Netherlands ♦ Italy ♦ Chile ♦ Peru ♦ South Africa ♦ United Kingdom ♦ France ♦ Brazil ♦ India ♦ Thailand
- Will count towards JD degree and may count towards Diploma Privilege requirements

Pass/Fail Option (SH 9.3)

- 2 *elective* P/F classes allowed by Law School Rules
- Courses eligible for P/F Option indicated on [Course Schedule](#) as PF
- Mandatory Pass/Fail do not count against elective limit (indicated on the Course Schedule as PF Only)



Pass/Fail Option (SH 9.3) Chart

Law School letter grade reported by instructor	Grade recorded on transcript if use Pass/Fail Option	Factored into your GPA?	Counts as one of your two Pass/Fail Options
B+, A-, A or A+	B+, A-, A, or A+	Yes	Yes
C, C+, B-, or B	S	No	Yes
F, D-, D, D+, or C-	F, D-, D, D+, or C-	Yes	Yes

Recorded grades are factored into the GPA and count as graded credits for The Order of the Coif & Dean's List eligibility



Transcript (SH 9.6)

- Official UW transcript – request through MyUW Student Center or University Office of the Registrar at <https://registrar.wisc.edu/transcript/>
 - No charge for official transcripts
 - Includes degree earned, conferral date, honors earned
 - Does **not** list Law School GPA
- Unofficial transcript, available through OCPD
 - Does list Law School GPA



Ranking & Class Standing

(SH 9.5)

- Rank vs. Class Standing
- The Law School does not make available students' class rank (except top ten rising 2 & 3Ls with the highest GPAs)
- Class standing tables (updated each term) are provided relating grade averages to approximate position in the class (based on credits earned)

Dean's Honor List (SH 9.7.2)

- Completion of at least 12 new credits in the fall or spring semester
- A GPA of at least 3.3 (on the 4.3 scale) on those credits, at least 8 of which must be graded on the 4.3 scale
- Completion of the credits by the due date for turning in grades at the end of the semester in question
- Recorded on transcript



Graduation Honors (SH 4.13.5)

Graduation Honors: *Minimum of 45 graded credits*

- Cum laude - 3.5 final GPA
- Magna cum laude - 3.75 final GPA
- Summa cum laude - 3.95 final GPA

Dean's Academic Achievement Award

- 3.5 GPA in penultimate semester
- Allows you to wear an honors stole at commencement



The Order of the Coif (SH 9.7.4)

A national honor scholastic society recognizing law students who attain a high grade of scholarship

- Top 10% of graduating class (or so)
- Requires 68 graded law credits
- Latest class **GPA was 3.66**

Note: If you exercise the elective pass-fail option and a grade is recorded, it counts as graded credits





Graduation & Beyond

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Graduating Early (SH 4.3)

- No more than 18 credits/semester
- Notify Registrar
- Meet with your OCPD Advisor
- You will not be forced to graduate early
- Attend separate graduation presentation in your penultimate semester

Bar Admission in States Other Than Wisconsin (SH 4.12)

- Multi-State Professional Responsibility Exam
 - Required in all jurisdictions except Wisconsin and Puerto Rico
 - When do most students take it?
- Start learning about the bar exam
 - One-on-one advising
 - Informational presentations during Fall semester
 - Start registering over winter break of 3L year
